**Academic Assessment Center****Goleman 122 - (209) 954-5535**

The purpose of academic assessment at San Joaquin Delta College is to ensure that your educational experience with us is productive and rewarding. We recognize that your time is valuable, and that is why it is important that you get involved in courses for which you are prepared. By measuring your current academic skills, the assessment evaluation will direct you to courses that will allow you to fulfill your goals and ambitions. Students who have taken the assessment but have misplaced their scores, or students who have alternative test scores from other institutions which they would like evaluated for assessment purposes should contact the Assessment Center.

**Academic Teams****American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME)****National Student Design Competition***Applied Science & Technology Division (ETECH 045)*

San Joaquin Delta College students design and fabricate a mechanical device to compete with other colleges and universities. The description of the task to be performed is published each year and ASME student members world-wide work at designing and fabricating their devices. Regional (California, Nevada, and Hawaii) and national competitions are held at selected university campuses. Prize money is awarded, including \$3000 to the first-place team at the national event. Students should have an interest in mechanical design and fabrication, and be an ASME member.

**Delta Engineering / Engineering Technology Day***Applied Science & Technology Division*

This annual event is hosted by the San Joaquin Delta College Engineering Department on the fourth Wednesday in January. Students taking drafting classes at high schools and middle schools in the SJDC District are invited to participate. The day includes drafting competitions for beginning and advanced drafting students. Students also bring mechanical and architectural drafting and design projects they have been working on since early in the school year, which are judged for drafting and design accuracy. Students also attend a career orientation presentation. Awards are presented to students in nine categories. Participating students must be attending middle school or high school in the District.

**Delta Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA)***Applied Science & Technology Division*

Delta VICA Club offers Regional, State, National, and International competition for vocational students taking vocational programs. Students compete in vocational areas such as: diesel equipment mechanics, drafting, air conditioning, machining, automotive mechanics, and many others. Students must be taking a course that relates to the area that they will compete in during the school year. They must also join Skills-USA at both the national and state levels.

**Engineering, Math & Science Challenge***Applied Science & Technology Division*

The goal for this competition is to excite young people about potential career areas in Engineering, Math and Science. This is accomplished by providing them with the opportunity to have “fun” working on a variety of on-site projects and/or problems related to the engineering design, math, life science, and physical science. Students from area high schools form teams consisting of 3 or 4 members. The teams are given 4 challenges, one in each of the areas mentioned above, and are given 3 hours to work on these problems. Gold, Silver and Bronze medals are awarded to each team member placing First, Second, and Third in each of the categories. Gold, Silver and Bronze medals are also awarded for the best overall performances. High School participants receive plaques for First, Second and Third place in the drafting competition. “Engineering, Math, Science

Challenge” is held annually during “Engineers’ Week” in February. This activity receives financial support from local professional engineers, Delta College and the San Joaquin County Office of Education.

**Journalism and Mass Communications***Fine Arts and Communication Division*

Students in the journalism/mass communication program at San Joaquin Delta College participate in conferences and competitions hosted twice a year by the Journalism Association of Community Colleges. The Northern California regional conference takes place each fall semester during October. The annual statewide conference takes place in April during spring semester. The competition includes all phases of newspaper production: reporting, editing, layout, photography and sports.

**Livestock Judging Team***Applied Science & Technology Division*

The San Joaquin Delta College Livestock Judging Team is a nationally competitive and highly respected educational event. The college team members regularly receive university scholarships and employment opportunities. Team members learn livestock selection principles that are relevant to breeding and market animal selection. Students learn communication and decision making skills that contribute to educational and social development. The Livestock Judging Team attends 15 state and national competitions each year.

**Livestock Show Team***Applied Science & Technology Division*

The San Joaquin Delta College Livestock Show Team is designed to enhance animal husbandry skills associated with the marketing of livestock. Delta College students learn to select, feed, fit/groom and present beef cattle, sheep and swine in a competitive market. Students participate in livestock shows and expositions at several California sites including the Cow Palace in San Francisco and the Tulare Livestock Exposition. Team members gain valuable experience to develop skills needed in an educational and commercial environment.

**Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) Mini Baja Competition***Applied Science & Technology Division (E-Tech 70)*

San Joaquin Delta College students design and fabricate a single-seat off-road racing vehicle to compete with over one hundred other colleges and universities. The competition includes producing a series of documents (design, cost analysis, safety), a sales presentation, and four racing events. The racing includes a hill climb, drag race, off-road obstacle course, and a four-hour endurance race. **Speech & Debate Team***Fine Arts and Communication Arts Division*

Students who join the Speech/Debate Team at San Joaquin Delta College participate in supervised intercollegiate speech and debate tournaments, workshops, and speaking assignments. Students are encouraged to develop their individual talents and abilities in speaking and interpreting literature which they accomplish through practice, competition and analysis of judges’ critiques. Moreover, students develop a sense of team spirit and pride as they represent Delta College.

**The Final Draft, Student Literary Magazine***English Language Arts Division*

Delta College students are encouraged to submit original poetry, short fiction, essays, or artwork in various media during the first two months of the fall and spring semesters. Students will be notified of acceptance in writing by The Final Draft staff, composed of Writing Lab tutors and volunteers. **Athletics - Intercollegiate****Baseball**

Delta College competes in the very competitive Big 8 Conference. Newly renovated with synthetic FIELD turf, Nick Cecchetti Field is one of the best facilities in Northern California. Delta College was also the home of current Cincinnati Reds Pitcher Eddie Guardado and Minnesota Twins Jason Bartlett.

**Basketball (Men)**

Brian Katz has been the Men's Head Basketball Coach at Delta for the past 14 years. During that time, the Mustangs have amassed a record of 321-132 including 2 appearances in the Elite Eight, and 3 in the Sweet Sixteen, 1 in the Final Four, and 6 Conference Championships. More importantly, Coach Katz has had 108 players come through the program. 102 of them have advanced to four-year institutions (62 on scholarships). 23 of those players have gone on to the Division level. His players have advanced to such schools as Washington State, University of Oklahoma, Gonzaga, Drake, Idaho State, Oregon State, University of the Pacific, U.C. Davis, UC Santa Barbara, and San Jose State University.

Coach Katz received a Bachelor's Degree in English from California State University Sacramento in 1980. After teaching and coaching at the high school level for seven years, he left Center High School for Santa Clara University in 1987. While serving as an assistant basketball coach, Katz earned a Master's Degree from Santa Clara University in Counseling Psychology. From 1989-1993, he was the Men's Basketball Coach and Physical Education instructor at Lassen College. Katz came to Delta in 1993.

**Basketball (Women's)**

The Lady Mustangs have been a program to contend with since their 1997 Bay Valley Conference title - the first ever at Delta College! The Lady Mustangs are coming off another championship year winning their 6th Conference Championship in a row. San Joaquin Delta College Women's Basketball formed a new conference in 2005 and have won both years back-to-back. The Lady Mustangs just finished their 2006-07 season 30-5 and advanced to the California State Elite 8 Tournament for the third year in a row.

In her eleven years as a head coach at Delta, Gina Johnson has enjoyed the competition of the tough Bay Valley Conference and now the Big 8 Conference. In the 1996-97 season, the Lady Mustangs participated in a Cinderella season for a program that had been struggling in previous years. Delta fell one game short of finishing an undefeated conference schedule (13-1). The Lady Mustangs finished the season 24-7 and went on to the second round of playoff competition. Since 1997 the Lady Mustangs have been a team to contend with in the Bay Valley Conference. The best team in Delta Women's Basketball history may be arguable be the 2001-02 Mustangs who finished 29-7 and were one game shy of competing for the California State Championship Game only. The Lady Mustangs finished 29-7 and had a remarkable year. Coach Johnson was named Northern California Coach of the Year by her colleagues for the many successes in 2002. In 2002-03 Mustangs finished 28-7 and earned a second Bay Valley Conference title. The Lady Mustangs shared the BVC title with league rival Sierra College. Johnson is proud of the players

that have graduated and or transferred to a four-year institution. There are a number of student-athletes that have earned basketball scholarships. She only hopes the trend continues.

A 1991 graduate of Cal Poly State University in San Luis Obispo, she finished her playing career in 1990 as a two-year starting guard for the Cal Poly Lady Mustangs. Prior to Cal Poly, Johnson was a junior college All-Conference player for DeAnza College. She was named MVP of the coast Conference in 1988 and was honored as a player to the California Community College First Team All-State. She holds a Masters Degree in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation from St. Mary's College.

**Men's and Women's Cross Country**

Coach King inherits a quality program from former Community College Hall of Famer Raydell Barkley. Coach King assisted Coach Barkley in Cross Country for two years. During that time the men's and women's cross country teams were in the top five in Northern California and placed in the top 15 in the California Community College State Championships.

Coach King earned his BA from Humboldt State University in 1983 and his Masters Degree in 1987. He is a certified Strength & Conditioning Specialist (CSCS). He has served as the State Director for the National Strength & Conditioning Association. His knowledge in strength and conditioning has had an impact on the numerous teams and athletes he has coached. His knowledge and experience has afforded him the opportunity to speak at two national conferences in Philadelphia and Las Vegas. His modalities and training programs enabled him to write numerous articles in scientific journals. His theories have proven to be effective and are now used worldwide. Coach King has four children and one grandchild.

**Football**

Gary Barlow begins his seventh season at the helm of Mustang Football. Since assuming the reins as Head Coach in 2001, Coach Barlow has led the program to a 41-23 combined record, program ranked #7 nationally by J.C. Gridwire and #2 in Northern California, 20-11 in conference, conference champions twice in five seasons, 2001 Shrine Bowl Champions, 2004 Holiday Bowl Champions, signed 51 student-athletes to full ride scholarship and have had 63 athletes make Academic All-Conference.

A Tracy High School product, Coach Barlow's playing career includes stints at the University of Wyoming (1985-86), Delta College (1987) and the University of the Pacific (1988-89). Following graduation from UOP, Gary was signed by the NFL's New York giants. He finished his playing days as a member of the Barcelona Dragons of the World Football League.

**Golf (Men)**

Van Sweet is in his 20th season as the Men's Golf Coach at Delta. His teams have gone on to be league champions seven of those seasons. In 1990 and 1997 his teams placed second at State. Before coming to Delta, Coach Sweet coached at the University of the Pacific for 11 years where he coached Basketball, Baseball and Golf. Coach Sweet was a counselor and health education instructor at Delta until his retirement in 1983. At Delta, he coached Men's Tennis, Softball, and Women's Basketball. Returning in 1988 to coach the Men's Golf team. Coach Sweet has a Master's Degree in Physical Education from the College of the Pacific.

**Soccer (Men)**

Tom Hoang has been the Head Men's Soccer Coach since 1997. In his second year coaching, he led the Mustangs to the playoffs and in his third year he led his team to win the Bay Valley Conference Championship for the first time in the history of the men's soccer program at Delta. Delta is currently a member of the Big 8 Conference. Many of Coach

Hoang's players have gone on to play at the Division I, II and III levels and several have gone on to compete at the professional level. Each year brings new challenges for the Mustangs in the form of new players with varying skills. In order to unite the diverse group, Coach Hoang manages an off-season team that allows new and returning players to get to know each other and continue to develop their skills while learning to play together as a team. This approach to team building has proven successful for Coach Hoang and will continue to produce a strong men's soccer team at Delta College.

### **Soccer (Women's)**

Lloyd Ratto has been the women's soccer coach since the program was added at Delta in 1990. Delta is a member of the very competitive Big 8 Conference. The team has reached the Nor Cal Playoffs the last three out of six years. Many of the girls that have gone on to play at Division I and Division II schools and have been very successful. Some of the schools Coach Ratto's players have advanced to are San Jose State University, Hayward State University, Martin Methodist College, and North Carolina.

Coach Ratto was honored by being named 1998 California Coaches Association High School Coach of the Year for girl's soccer. Then in 1999, he was awarded the National Federation of Interscholastic Coaches Association Section Seven Girl's Soccer Distinguished Service Award.

Coach Ratto received his B.A. and Masters Degrees in Physical Education from the University of the Pacific.

### **Softball**

Delta College Softball is a member of the very competitive Big 8 Conference. In the past eight seasons, the Lady Mustangs have won conference championship 4 times, competed in the State Tournament 3 times earning 4th and 5th places, seven players earned All-American and three All-State honors.

### **Swimming/Diving (Men's & Women's)**

In 1994 the Delta College men's swimming team were undefeated league champions. This was the first time since 1966. In 1999 the women's swim team were league champions and in 2000 both the men and women's swimming teams were league champions. During the 2000 swim season, as a swimmer at Delta, Renee Locarnini was the fastest in the nation in the 100 IM and second in the 100 yard breaststroke. In 2006 the men and women's swimming teams set 14 new school records. The men's team was 5th in the State and had nine Community College All-Americans.

### **Men's and Women's Track & Field**

Coach King returned to the track after a four-year contribution to the Delta College Football program. After a very successful collegiate career at Humboldt State University, Coach King began his track and field coaching experience at Eureka High School. He also earned experience at Apple Valley High School and East Union High School. His teams at East Union were some of the most successful in the school's history. Numerous athletes from East Union furthered their track careers successfully after Coach King's tutelage.

Coach King assisted former head coaches Merv Smith and Raydell Barkley. During his tenure as an assistant coach, he has coached some of Delta's most successful middle distance runners and hurdlers. Coach King is a certified Strength & Conditioning Specialist (CSCS). He has served as the State Director for the National Strength & Conditioning Association. His knowledge in strength and conditioning has had an impact on the numerous teams and athletes he has coached. His knowledge and experience has afforded him the opportunity to speak at two national conferences in Philadelphia and Las Vegas. His modalities and training programs enabled him to write numerous articles in scientific journals. His theories have proven to be effective and are now used worldwide. Coach King has four children and one grandchild.

### **Volleyball (Women's)**

The women's volleyball team has been a perennial powerhouse in the State for the past 25 years and especially in Northern California. In the past 25 seasons they have recorded an 82% win/loss record with 736 wins and 148 losses. In that time they have recorded first place in their conference a total of 17 times, second place three times, and third place six times. They have participated in the prestigious California State Championships thirteen times placing in the top 3 in ten of the past thirteen seasons.

In the past seven seasons Delta has turned out seven All-Americans. As a result of participating in the volleyball program at Delta College many players have gone on to compete at the Division I, II and III levels including the University of the Pacific, Long Beach State, University of Oregon, UNLV, Cal Poly SLO, Weber State, St. Mary's College, University of Wyoming, Cal State Fullerton, San Jose State University, Fordham University, and Eastern Tennessee to name a few.

### **Water Polo (Men)**

Delta Water Polo is a member of the Big 8 Conference. The Delta College men's water polo teams earned conference championships in 1981, 1982, 1983, 1987, 1988, 1990, 1996, 1998, and 2002. The 1998 team was the first team in schools history to make it to the State Championship Tournament. The 2002 went undefeated in league, were named #3 in Northern California and placed 8th at the State Tournament. In all the other years, Delta has finished no lower than third place.

### **Water Polo (Women)**

Delta's women's water polo begins its 7th season under head coach Mike Leabo in the Fall of 2007. The Lady Mustangs have qualified for the Northern California Championships 4 out of the last 5 seasons. Coach Leabo was voted Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2002 in the Bay Valley Conference and in the Big 7 South Conference in 2005.

Leabo was the head water polo and swim coach at St. Mary's High School in Stockton for 13 years before coming to Delta College. As an athlete, Leabo was a high school All-American Water Polo player at Tokay High School during the 1979 and 1980 seasons. In his four years at Tokay, 1997-1980, his teams compiled a 94-6 overall record.

Fall 2007 should be a big season for the Delta ladies. Look for big things from the women's program!

### **Wrestling**

Michael Sandler has been the wrestling coach at Delta College for the ten nine years. During that time, the Mustangs have steadily improved and gained respect throughout the state. In the past nine years, Delta wrestling has had 47 State qualifiers, 16 place at State, 18 Academic All-Americans, and 3 All-Americans. Delta wrestlers have enjoyed success at the next level and our hope is to continue growing and adding to the success of Delta wrestling.

Warren Atherton Auditorium is a 1,456-seat theatre with a 60-foot proscenium and full grid system. Tillie Lewis Theatre is a 393-seat venue with a 40-foot proscenium. Both Atherton and Lewis Theatres are equipped with a hydraulic orchestra pit. The Studio theatre seats 110 and is a common black-box theatre. The theatres are equipped with sound and state-of-the-art lighting systems.

The 2,000 square-foot L.H. Horton Jr. Gallery schedules shows throughout the year and has hosted artists from around the world.

With over 60,000 guests annually, the Delta Center or for the Arts is a hub of activity for the campus and community. It has played host to numerous internationally acclaimed artists, and celebrities. Students at San Joaquin Delta College perform regularly on its stages in recitals, concerts and plays. Ensembles from the Department of Music and Dance produce a variety of events including jazz concerts, band concerts, choral concerts and dance recitals. The Department of Drama produces a series of plays aimed at appealing to a variety of audiences including musical theatre, serious drama and theatre for children.

In addition to supporting the college's academic programs, Delta Center for the Arts has hosted Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain, Shimon Perez of Israel, and American leaders including Secretary of State Colin Powell, and General Norman Schwarzkopf just to name a few. The Stockton Symphony calls the center home as well. Throughout the year, they perform a series of concerts in Atherton Auditorium.

**Book Refunds/Exchanges**

- Available through the 2nd week of the fall and spring semester
- Available through the 1st week of the summer session
- Full Refund applies to books purchased for the current term only. See buy-back policy below for books purchased from previous semesters.
- To receive a refund, a student must provide:
  - o Cash register receipt
  - o Class schedule
  - o An ID

To receive a full refund, new books must be in perfect (mint) condition. Otherwise, returns are subject to a 25% reduction. (The Bookstore reserves the right to make a determination on the condition of books). Workbooks, study guides, syllabi, etc. are only eligible for refunds if returned new and unused. Generally online bundles with software and access codes are not refundable if package has been opened. Opened packages that qualify for a refund may be subject to a rewrapping charge. There is no refund on supplies, non-required books, plays, software or electronics.

**Book Buy-Back** — Best price offered LAST week of each semester. The Bookstore's commitment to students is to buy back as many books at the end of each semester as can possibly be resold the following term. That usually includes over 80% of book titles.

Students can sell back books any time, but the best price is offered during the last week of the semester/session for those books that are needed the next immediate semester. Books sold back at ANY OTHER TIME will be bought back for a used book dealer and only at the "wholesale" prices listed in their catalog.

- During the last week of each semester, the Bookstore will pay

- Discontinued books may still have a "wholesale" value, if the edition is current. We buy these books for a USED BOOK company that resells them to other schools. "Wholesale" values are approximately 25% of the original new price.

**CalWORKs Assessment****5405 N. Pershing Avenue, Suite A (209) 870-7013**

The CalWORKs Assessment Center is located across the street from the college on the corner of Pershing and Venetian. The center provides assessment services required by the San Joaquin County Human Services Agency (HSA) for individuals enrolled in their CalWORKs program. Services are available only through referral from HSA or its contract agencies by appointment.

The CalWORKs Program at San Joaquin Delta College is run entirely by employees of the College. While we strive to work closely with the staff members of the Human Services Agency (HSA), we are not funded through the county. Our purpose is to help students, who are receiving cash assistance from HSA, be successful in achieving their educational goals.

We provide assistance with applying for admission and financial aid, preparing class schedules and enrolling in courses, referrals to resources on and off campus, free child care on campus, work study, employment preparation and advocacy to students' CalWORKs Case Managers.

The mission of the CalWORKs staff is to provide quality service and assist students receiving cash aid (TANF) from the Human Services Agency.

- We serve as advocates for CalWORKs students by openly communicating with their case managers.
- We recognize and understand the socio-economic and cultural diversity of our student population.

**Career-Transfer Center****Danner 202 - (209) 954-5634**

Career-Transfer Center services are designed to ease the transition to a four-year university by providing assistance with the transfer process. Services include online admissions application workshops, transfer admission agreements, on-the-spot admissions, field trips, appointments with visiting university representatives and major preparation advising.

**Child Development Center****(209) 954-5700**

Delta College students and staff are eligible to enroll their children and grandchildren in the Child Development Center. Children ages 3 months through 12 years are cared for in a loving, nurturing, developmentally appropriate environment designed to meet the needs of each child. Parents are able to have their children near while they attend classes and use our observation rooms to view their child's play. Free or low cost child care is available to qualifying parents of infants, toddlers and preschoolers. Parents interested in this State funded program must provide verification of income, demonstrate need, and participate in the child's classroom. Pre-enrollment forms are required for all State funded programs. Families are also accepted on a full pay basis. Parents paying their own child care fees will be eligible to have a portion of their child

care fees subsidized by the Gladys Benerd Endowment. Please stop by the Child Development Center for a fee schedule.

**Clever Planetarium and Earth Sciences Center**

The George H. Clever Planetarium at San Joaquin Delta College provides a comprehensive series of space science and earth science education programs to school children from Stockton, Manteca, Lodi, Tracy, Rio Vista, Sacramento, Modesto and the Mother Lode, including Sonora. The planetarium regularly hosts school field trips from as far away as Fresno in the south to Chico in the north. The Clever Planetarium features a Spitz 512 prime sky instrument nicknamed Herman, which projects the stars on a 33 foot aluminum dome. This instrument can show the sky of any date-past, present or future-from any location on Earth. All the motions of the planet Earth can be simulated and accelerated so that days, years, centuries or a millennia can be made to pass before the viewers' eyes in a matter of minutes.

To be considered "official" a transcript must arrive in an envelope still sealed by the college at which the courses were taken. For colleges outside of California, students should also submit course descriptions or catalogs from each school at which courses were taken. Once all official transcripts have arrived in the Evaluations Office, the student may request an evaluation. This evaluation will show which units are degree applicable and which requirements still need to be fulfilled to obtain an Associate Degree. Please allow a minimum of three weeks to have the evaluation completed. Once the student receives a copy of the evaluation, he/ she should work with a counselor for assistance in planning courses to meet the student's educational goals.

- Intention to enroll as a full time student in the following Fall Semester

Students will learn to improve their self awareness and interpersonal skills. They will explore career options, Delta College certificate, AA/AS, and four year universities transfer options through UC and CSU field trips. Campus Police Officers are certified by and meet the selection of training requirements set forth by the Commission on Peace Officers Standards and Training for the State of California Penal Code Section 13510(a).

**Crime Prevention & Crime Reporting**

One of the essential ingredients of any successful crime prevention program is an informed public. It is the intent of San Joaquin Delta College to inform students and staff, in a timely manner, of any criminal activity or security problems which may pose a reasonable threat to their physical safety. Such information will normally be distributed to students, faculty and staff through several campus publications. The

Impact and the Mustang Bulletin are two student publications. Staff are informed through The Staff Notes newsletter, in-house memos or bulletins and electronic mail. Another critical element of a campus safety program is education. Campus Police, the Student Activities Office, and the Counseling Department sponsor programs on various topics. Finally, all effective crime prevention programs include some measure of people watching out for one another. All staff and students are asked to be security conscious and involved.

**Lost and Found**

Several hundred items of found property are turned in each year, most of which are never claimed by the rightful owners. One reason is that the property cannot be traced back to the owner. The other reason is that persons who lose property do not always check with the Campus Police to learn if their property has been found. Property that is marked with a name, phone number, or driver's license can be returned to the owner if found and turned in to Campus Police. Owners of property with no identification should check with the Campus Police in case it has been found.

**Lockouts**

Vehicle owners who are locked out of their vehicles may request assistance from Campus Police to gain entry into the locked vehicle.

**Victims of Crime**

Students who become the victim of a crime or witness a crime being committed should contact the Campus Police as soon as possible. Time is essential when a crime has been committed. The quicker the police department is notified, the quicker the response. Persons who believe that a crime may be occurring, or are suspicious that something is wrong, should contact the Campus Police. The police would rather respond to an innocent situation than not be notified when an actual crime has been committed.

Many components work together to prepare Puente students to transfer to four year universities; English instruction, counseling and mentors.

**Reading/Writing Learning Center****Holt 201 – (209) 954-5297**

The Reading/Writing Learning Center offers support to students throughout their college experience and serves those who wish to improve their comprehension of college-level material. Tutoring Services are available free of charge, up to three hours per week per course. Students interested in serving as tutors should also contact the Learning Center.

**Reentry Services****Danner 203 - (209) 954-5679**

Reentry Services eases the transition of students returning to the academic environment after an extended absence. Services include orientation, registration assistance, counseling referrals, peer advisors, student workshops, career exploration and assessment, child care information, campus and community referrals.

Regional Education is provided by offering college courses which provide the opportunity to complete most or all course work outside of the campus classroom - in a local community classroom, or in your own home on your own time.

Dameron offers a program for smoking cessation, which is free of charge, but a \$10.00 voluntary donation to the American Cancer Society is requested since they provide the classroom materials to Dameron. The program consists of 5 one-hour classes taught by a pharmacist and is a type of support group for smokers. Most insurance will cover the prescriptions for patches, Zyban, etc. which may be prescribed, including Medi-Cal.
